Farm and business energy audits underway

Carbon audits are underway at a total of 60 businesses and farms across Herefordshire, thanks to funding from the council's climate reserve.

Among the businesses to benefit from the scheme is Shepherds Ice Cream. Manager Connie Orbach (pictured third from left) commented: "The whole process was very easy, Stephen from Severn Wye came out to see us and take a look at how we work, and then he got back to us with a report within 10 days. The report highlighted some things we specifically wanted to look at plus gave a few extra suggestions we hadn't considered – all in all a very helpful process."

The audits will help farms and businesses reduce their carbon footprints - and save costs - as part of the county's drive to reach net zero by 2030.
